Kevin Rudd fears the west is at a turning point in its relations with Russian. He said the Russian intervention in Georgia was now a very complex situation and the international community's response to it was a very difficult challenge. But he refused to rule out sales of Australian uranium to Russia, despite a Labor-led parliamentary committee recommending delaying the ratification of a treaty between the two nations.

Yet the open-ended nature of such questions makes a rating meaningless.
