- 1. <u>ADF Medical Team Goes To Bali</u>, SBS, 2005-10-03The Australian Defence Force has deployed a special medical team to Bali while 10 federal police officers have arrived on the Indonesian island to assist in the investigation into Saturday's bombings
- 2. <u>Jemmah Islamiah Blamed For Bali Bombing</u>, Radio Australia, 2005-10-03Indonesian authorities say suicide bombers were responsible for the bomb blasts that killed at least 26 people on Bali. Officials have blamed Jemmah Islamiah for the attacks saying the bombs looked like the work of two Malaysian fugitives believed to have masterminded similar attacks in the past.
