- China's Secret Uranium Bid Richard Baker, Age 2005-10-17China has asked the Federal Government if it can conduct its own <u>uranium exploration and mining operations in Australia</u>. Confidential diplomatic cables obtained by The Age show the Chinese told Australian officials of their interest at a February meeting in Beijing.

Australia expressed a <u>hope to strengthen military ties with the PLA</u> through more mutual high-level visits, strategic consultations and exchanges among military institutes from both countries.

AAP, News.com.au, 2005-10-14British Prime Minister Tony Blair has sent his chief scientific adviser to Australia to convince the Federal Government to <u>sign up to the Kyoto protocol on</u> <u>greenhouse gas emissions</u>.

4. Howard To Double ASIO's Staff After Review

John Breusch, AFR, 2005-10-17Prime Minister John Howard announced that the <u>staff of the</u> <u>Australian Secret Intelligence Organisation (ASIO) would increase from 980 to 1860</u> - triple its size of just three years ago - by 2010, in keeping with the recommendations of a confidential review of ASIO conducted by former Australian Security Intelligence Service (ASIS) chief Allan Taylor. Announcing the increased staffing for ASIO in Sydney yesterday, Mr Howard said that although the review of the organisation commenced before the July terrorist attacks in London, the bombings had encouraged the government to accept Mr Taylor's recommendations. It is expected to run into the tens of millions of dollars. [Subscription required.]
