- Alkatiri Agrees to Investigation of Start of Mayhem, Lindsay Murdoch, SMH, 2006-06-08East
 Timor's Prime Minister, Mari Alkatiri, has agreed to an international investigation into his
 handling of the country's crisis, including claims that he ordered the shooting of civilian
 demonstrators. Mr Alkatiri denies responsibility for a violent demonstration in Dili on April 28,
 when a number of civilians were shot. He claims unnamed political forces have been trying to
 topple the Government through violence.

- 3. Timor Asks for More NZ Help, RNZ, TVNZ, 2006-06-08The East Timorese government has asked New Zealand for more people to be sent to help secure the stability of the country. Defence Minister Phil Goff says the government will consider the request but would want it to be part of a wider international effort. There are currently about 160 New Zealand defence force personnel in Timor, including 8 military police.

- 5. Troops to Minister: Does One of Us Have to Die Before It's War? Cynthia Banham and Brendan Nicholson, Age, 2006-06-08Defence Minister Brendan Nelson angered troops when he told them their service in East Timor was not officially considered "warlike". The soldiers fired questions at the minister until they were ordered to stop. This means that the 2600 Australian Defence Force personnel in East Timor will receive a non-warlike service allowance instead of the combat pay given to soldiers in Iraq and Afghanistan.
- 6. Security Treaty to Smooth Over Rift with Jakarta, Mark Forbes, SMH, 2006-06-08Indonesia and Australia will commit to a historic security treaty when the PM, John Howard, meets President Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono this month. The treaty is expected to include military-to-military cooperation, intelligence sharing and joint naval and surveillance patrols. Ties between armed forces will be strengthened by exchange and training programs. Australia will pledge support for Indonesia's territorial integrity.
