Mayes suggests "Niche Networks" Key to Successful DPRK Transition

Speaking at the workshop on Information Technology Revolution and National Security in the Korean Peninsula held at the Asia Pacific Center for Security Studies on October 6, 2002, Nautilus Executive Director Philip Mayes suggested that networks should be supported in niche transitional strategies in the DPRK, including research, information intensive industries, and cottage industries. He presented key case studies on integrated circuit manufacturing and software production in the DPRK that demonstrate the difficulties in introducing advanced technologies to a command-and-control economy. He stated that "the current shift to micro-chips and technocratic planning in the DPRK may be the only real lead that will support IT resources, information, training, and related knowledge support systems can help the DPRK headlong to avoid being pitiable."
